Subject: Plumas Lake East Park

Message: We live near the new Feather River Plumas Lake East Park. I am told that there are no plans to put a bathroom at the new park. The park is classified as a "neighborhood" park, so that local visitors to the park are expected to walk home to use the bathroom. Yet the park has a baseball diamond. I want you all to know how glad we are that after 12 years, the east side is finally getting a park. Thank you for that. But I strongly request and it seems like an obvious need to also provide a bathroom. Imagine a mother with her children visiting the park from the several blocks away within that subdivision. Imagine also a team of young people with their families and friends playing baseball at the park, gathered, no doubt, from the schools on the west side. How will such a mother accommodate her children's basic needs, or how will a crowd of children and parents and friends be able to enjoy the baseball game at the park knowing that any one of the large group gathered together there will have no place to use a public restroom? I'm told by the construction crew that construction of a bathroom costs somewhat less than \$200,000. If you conservatively figure 6,000 residents in Plumas Lake, that equates to \$33/person. Spread out over 10 years, that's \$3/year additional cost for a bathroom. Seems hard to justify leaving out such a fundamental feature of a public park. Thank you kindly for your consideration in this matter. -- Rick Warta
